The readers' focus: Rejoicing in Difficult Places

Date written: A.D. 60

Who wrote the book: The Apostle Paul **Type of book:** Prison letter

The book was written to: The saints at Philippi. A large number were gentiles and not Jews.

Setting: The apostle writes this letter from prison in Rome

CHAPTER 1

1.	Paul greets saints, bishop	s, and deacons with grace from	God and Jesus Christ ((vs. 1-2)
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- 2. Paul expresses heartfelt devotion for the Philippians while in a Roman prison (vs. 3-8)
- 3. Paul wants the Philippians to increase in love, knowledge, and righteousness (vs. 9-11)
- 4. Paul is in prison at Rome, but many in Rome are hearing the gospel as a result (vs. 12-18)
- 5. Paul asks the Philippians to pray that he will be delivered from prison (vs. 19)
- 6. Paul desires to visit the Philippians, but if he's executed it would only benefit him (vs. 20-26)
- 7. Paul desires the Philippians to stand together against suffering from enemies (vs. 27-30)

CHAPTER 2

- 1. Paul compels the church not to have disputes, but have a mind to serve others (vs. 1-5, 14-15)
- 2. Paul uses Christ as the example of humility and suffering (vs. 5-8)
- 3. Paul gives examples of the joyous elevation Christ received by staying true to God despite extreme suffering (vs. 9-11)
- 4. Paul wants the Philippians to be mature in his absence, knowing God is present (vs. 12-16)
- 5. Paul doesn't know if he will be executed, but God gives him grace to rejoice (vs. 17-18)
- 6. Paul ends the chapter with examples of other faithful servants and their ministries (vs. 19-30)
