- The Church at Study - A Study on Hope

The word "hope" is often associated with a person's expectation of God's salvation. In the Old Testament, God was the object of the righteous. They waited for His salvation. Many of the Old Testament saints also hoped for the final deliverer (Messiah), who would establish His kingdom on earth. We, (the church), look (or hope) for Him, also. He is the risen One: the "first-born" from the dead, and our hope is that we will (like He did) rise; and we will meet the Lord in the air. Hope, in large part (for the church) has to do with our trust that God will one day physically deliver the righteous from earth to heaven. Our hope is an anchor of the soul, IT SHOUD NOT WAVER. In other words, there is nothing that can keep us from our belief in our final deliverance from the world, evil, and demonic influences. Our hope is in Christ who has already entered into the heavenly veil. Although we live on earth, our unwavering hope is in the veil, as well (Heb. 6:19). Faith waivers; our hope in the person of Jesus Christ, His existence, and our one day being with Him should never fail! We may become weak in our faith, but not in the Person, Jesus Christ. It is possible to be little in faith, but still have hope in the eternal One. The apostle Peter waivered in his FAITH during his denial of Christ. Although he claimed he never knew Christ, his hope in Him never diminished. Only at the death of Christ did Peter and the other disciples lose all HOPE, and that was renewed when the diciples saw the risen Christ. Our hope enters into the heavenly veil where we wait for a final deliverance! It is a hope in a final deliverance or resurrection. New Testament scriptures are mainly used below, to attempt to define the word hope. The object of hope in a number of the scriptures below refer to either God the Father, or the Lord Jesus Christ, Hope, therefore, is often in expectation of the Person, Jesus, who God has made both Lord and Christ (Messiah). Hope, in large part, speaks of something more eternal than faith. This means, for example, that the word "hope" is rarely defined as someone believing that God will heal them of a physical condition. Faith is a word better used for our belief in healings and believing God for temporal blessings.

Some misunderstand I Peter 3:15. We do not try to fulfill the scripture by attempting to "give an answer" to every man concerning the meaning of <u>every passage from scriptures</u>. That is impossible! We are to give an answer to every man that asks concerning the HOPE we have. The hope in this scripture refers to the HOPE OF A FINAL RESURRECTION. We are to share with the unsaved the reason why we live the way we live in a dark world. It is our expectancy of one day seeing our Saviour.
